CAMERATA TINTA BAROCCA.

founded in Cape Town by violinist Quentin Crida in July 2004, is the leading South African baroque ensemble playing on period instruments. Its name is derived from the musicians' passion for baroque music and red wine. The members include some of Cape Town's finest musicians who embrace a historically informed performance practice approach. CTB's concerts have been broadcast on Fine Music Radio and have received critical acclaim in the Cape Times and Die Burger. Mostly playing music from the 18th century, CTB has worked with leaders in their fields, such as baroque violinists Antoinette Lohmann and Pauline Nobes; violinists David Juritz, Darragh Morgan and Zoe Beyers; countertenor Christopher Ainslie; male soprano Philipp Mathmann; recorder player Stefan Temmingh; mandolin player Alon Sariel and conductor Arian Tien.

Apart from CTB's annual concert series in their home, St Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Cape Town, the ensemble regularly accompanies opera and oratorio performances, and performs in festivals throughout South Africa. CTB also has an active outreach component, which includes an annual education tour to the West Coast (the Matzikama Music Week), the Sunshine Concerts (an outreach programme for people unable to attend concerts because they are elderly, indigent or disabled in some way), as well as a regular collaboration with the Keiskamma Music Academy in the Eastern Cape.

Since 2011 CTB has gradually moved towards playing on period instruments. Currently it is the only period ensemble in South Africa that regularly plays in orchestral format, performing most of its annual concerts on period instruments. In 2013 CTB, in collaboration with the Cape Consort, gave the first South African period performance of Handel's Messiah. During November 2016 CTB played for Cape Town Opera's first production to use a period instrument orchestra: Monteverdi's L'Orfeo, directed by Jaco Bouwer and conducted by Erik Dippenaar. In December 2016 CTB was nominated for a KYKNET Fiesta award for a programme titled Handel in the drawing room presented during the 2016 Klein Karoo Klassique festival. In September 2017 CTB successfully launched the first annual Cape Town Baroque Festival.

In 2015 CTB set up a collaboration with the early music ensemble Collegium Musicum at the South African College of Music, University of Cape Town, through which two student cadets annually receive hands-on training in period performance in CTB projects. The cadet scheme is generously supported by the Claude Leon Foundation. In July 2015 Erik Dippenaar was appointed Artistic Director of CTB, Michael Maas (former CEO of the Artscape Theatre Centre) as Administrative Coordinator, and Cheryl de Havilland as Outreach Coordinator, www.ctbarogue.co.za

ERIK DIPPENAAR,

graduated from the Royal College of Music, London with a MMus (distinction) in 2007 and an Artist Diploma in 2008. His teachers included Margaret Phillips (organ), Terence Charlston and Jane Chapman (harpsichord) and Geoffrey Govier (fortepiano). Erik is currently Artistic Director of the Cape Town-based baroque orchestra Camerata Tinta Barocca, a member of the period ensemble The Cape Consort and a part-time lecturer in Western music history and historical performance practice at the University of Cape Town. He is now studying towards a PhD in music at UCT, focussing on the role historical domestic keyboard instruments played in the colonisation process in Southern Africa.

ELSABÉ RICHTER is a South African Soprano bearing an M.Mus. degree in Vocal Performance from the North-West University, where she studied under renowned baritone Werner Nel. During her studies she was awarded several prizes and bursaries, most notably a Norwegian scholarship for a year's academic study in Oslo as part of her M.Mus degree. Here she studied at the Norwegian Academy of Music under the guidance of tenor Svein Bjørkøy, baritone Håkan Hagegård and soprano Mona Julsrud. She has received masterclasses from various singers and musicians including Kobie van Rensburg, Marcel Beekman, Maarten Koningsberger, Albie and Hanna van Schalkwyk, Mimi Coertse, Erica Eloff, Eric Müller, Patricia Misslin, Paul Kiesgen and Lawrence Zazzo.

Her repertoire encompasses a wide range of early music, art songs and opera as well as oratorio and other sacred works. Prominent operatic roles include Susanna (in Mozart's 'Le Nozze di Figaro'); Galatea (in Handel's 'Acis and Galatea'), Belinda in Purcell's 'Dido and Aeneas'. Most recently she took to the stage in 'Lamento' — a pastiche Monteverdi opera arranged by Kobie van Rensburg; featured on the January 2017 Front page of Opern Welt Magazine and nominated for the 2017 YAMawards. Her sacred repertoire includes Handel's Messiah, Vivaldi's Gloria, J.S. Bach's Passions, Motets, Christmas Oratorio and several cantatas, Keiser's St. Mark's Passion, Charpentier's Te Deum, Haydn's Little Organ Mass, as well as Mozart's Exsultate Jubilate, Regina Coeli (K127) and several of his masses, including the Coronation Mass. Elsabé was nominated for a 2017 kykNET Fiësta Award together with Camerata Tinta Barocca for their Art Festival programme titled 'Handel in die Voorkamer', as well as for a 2017 WOORDtroFEE as part of the Cape Town Camerata's production 'Palissandertaal'. Elsabé currently resides in Paarl and teaches singing on a freelance basis. She regularly performs as soloist and with various ensembles including Camerata Tinta Barocca, the Cape Consort, the Cape Soloists Choir, the Cape Town Camerata and Baroque2000.

CARIN VAN HEERDEN was born in Cape Town (South Africa). She studied the recorder with Günther Höller (Cologne) and Walter van Hauwe (Amsterdam) and the baroque oboe with Helmut Hucke (Cologne). She was the winner of international music competitions, among them the renowned international ARD competition in Munich (1988). She works with various ensembles and orchestras conducted by Ton Koopman, Alan Curtis, Konrad Junghänel und Hermann Max. She was professor at the Mozarteum in Salzburg from 1993-2004 and subsequently at the Cologne Musikhochschule until 2008. At present she teaches the baroque oboe and recorder and heads the Institute for Early Music and Performance Practice at the Anton Bruckner Privatuniversität in Linz.

Carin van Heerden is co-founder of the Austrian L'Orfeo Barockorchester, directed by Michi Gaigg, and works with this orchestra (also as soloist) in Europe and South Africa. Solo CD's with her playing have been released by cpo (Telemann and Myslivecek), Cavalli Records (Hotteterre) and Sony (Telemann). She is the German translator of Bruce Haynes' "Eloquent Oboe". She is often invited as member of the jury at international competitions for Early Music and for master classes internationally.

LYNELLE KENNED a UCT Opera School graduate, is no stranger to the stage. Performances include Musetta in "La Boheme", Julie in "Showboat", Cherubino in "Le nozze di Figaro", and Saartjie in the award-winning "Poskantoor". Musical theatre credits include Mrs Lyons in David Kramer's "Blood Brothers", Mattie Allen in "Orpheus in Africa", Klara in "Heidi - The Musical", Maria in "The Sound of Music" and Grace in the world premiére of "Calling Me Home". For her portrayal of Maria in "West Side Story" in 2015 she was awarded a Fleur du Cap Award, and the Naledi Award for reprising the role at the Joburg Theatre in 2017.

A collaboration with Albert Combrink and Clint Lesch saw them walk away with a coveted Fiësta Award for the recital "Hunkering na die Ses - 'n musikale reis" in 2017.

Lynelle is a well-known media personality and TV Presenter after bursting onto the scene as the runner-up in the Top Billing Presenter Search in 2012. She subsequently appeared as presenter on "Pasella" and hosts "Jý Geld" on KykNET, a show aimed at financial empowerment for women.

LUSIBALWETHU SESANTI is a 21 year old mezzo soprano from Uitenage, South Africa. Sesanti's performance history includes appearances in Stellenbosch Univesity's production of Mozart's Le Nozze di Figaro and Kissing with Coffee productions, Artscape's Oratorio of a forgotten youth and more recently made her operatic debut as a principle cast member (Miss Todd) in AGL Opera's The Old Maid and the Thief by C.G Menotti. One of her biggest achievement's was her winning the Mabel Quick Singing Competition, aged 19. Sesanti is currently completing her 4rd year BMus Performance under Mrs Minette du Toit-Pearce (voice) and Ms Suzette Brits (percussion).

VOX CAPE TOWN the city's most innovative choral collective, spans musical history in its focus on a cappella works, oratorios and local compositions to enrich the musical life of Cape Town. Founded in 2015 to continue the choral legacy of the St George's Singers, led for over fifty years by Dr Barry Smith, VOX intends to invigorate local choral music through imaginative programming and staging to create intimate, immersive sensory experiences.

In pursuit of this aim, VOX embarked on a series of concerts designed to expose Cape Town's audiences to fresh choral sounds. These "New Soundscapes" performances featured a smorgasbord of contemporary choral music ranging from Arvo Pärt to Eric Whitacre. Besides performing in traditional choral spaces, VOX participates in the "In The Dark" series in the Youngblood Gallery and also presents a multisensory wine and music pairing called "ViniChoral" at Groot Constantia. Outreach and community involvement are important aspects of VOX's musical and social vision and these include fruitful collaborations with Fine Music Radio and local ensembles such as Camerata Tinta Barocca. Architect JOHN RENNIE is a UCT graduate and former senior lecturer and has worked in general practice, with a bias towards conservation, in Cape Town and beyond. John graduated in 1966, assisted Gawie Fagan for four years and was with Revel Fox & Partners thereafter. 1973/4 was spent in York attending full-time post-graduate courses where John was the first South African to gain the University of York Conservation Studies Diploma. As compiler of the 1978 Cape Institute of Architects "Buildings of Central Cape Town" survey John has researched and become familiar with many local landmarks. John has been responsible for work on several important Cape homesteads as well as various city halls and the landmark Gilbert Scott Cathedral of St Michael and St George in John's birthplace, Grahamstown.

RALITZA MACHEVA was born in Pleven, Bulgaria. She graduated with a Masters Degree in Music from the Music Academy in Sofia, studying under Prof. Boyan Lechev. She then furthered her studies at the Music Conservatorium in Enschede, Netherlands with Prof. A.Kramarov. Ralitza received first prize at the Bela Bartok International Chamber Music Festival, followed by various radio and television solo recordings and performances. Previous positions held include principal violin in the chamber ensemble Amadeus in Seoul, South Korea and associate concertmaster of the Pleven Philharmonic Orchestra in Bulgaria. She joined the KwaZulu-Natal Philharmonic Orchestra in 2000 as co-principal second violin. As a result of her interest in baroque music and period performance, Ralitza took up the position of leader of Baroque2000, the Durbanbased baroque ensemble. She has had master classes with Chiara Banchini at the Schola Cantorum in Basel, Switzerland and worked with Antoinette Lohmann in South Africa.

REFILOE OLIFANT started violin at the age of 8 at Bochabela Primary School in the rural town of Mangaung, Bloemfontein, under Ms Isabella Bonnet. In 1999, she became leader of the Bochabela String Orchestra conducted and directed by Peter Guy. She continued her studies with Prof Derek Ochse until 2001. She has participated in the Stellenbosch International Chamber Music Festival, Musica Mundi International Chamber Festival, Stift International Music Festival and South African National Youth Orchestra, where she had the privilege to work under batons of Arjan Tien, Jonas Alber, Daniel Raskin and Evgeny Bushkov. In 2007, Olifant was invited by Jan Repko to Chethams School of Music in Manchester for private lessons. She has received master classes and private lessons from Julia Bushkova, Daniel Rowland, Robert Waters, Evgeny Bushkov, Leonid Kerbel, Frank Stadler, and Priya Mitchell. She has performed as a soloist with the Odeion Symphony Orchestra, Johannesburg Philharmonic Orchestra, University of Stellenbosch Symphony Orchestra and Camerata Tinta Barocca. She also was invited as a soloist for the Hugo Lambrechts Concerto Festival and KZN Philharmonic Youth Concerto Festival. From 2008 - 2009 Refiloe studied at Stellenbosch University in the Certificate Programme. She returned to University of Stellenbosch where she graduated Cum Laude for the Diploma in Practical Music. Refiloe had the opportunity to perform J.S Bach Concerto for Two Violins with world renowned violinist Joshua Bell, accompanied by the University of Stellenbosch Camerata. Currently Refiloe is a member of the KZN Philharmonic Orchestra.

BRIDGET RENNE-SALONEN is active as a solo, chamber and principal orchestral flautist, and has appeared as soloist with several South African orchestras. As the Solo Principal Flute of the Cape Town Philharmonic Orchestra, she was the recipient of the prestigious Ben & Faye Carklin Award for Artistic Excellence. Recent awards include Fiesta, Silver Ovation, and Oppenheimer Memorial Trust awards. Bridget is the principal flute of the Cape Town Festival Orchestra, permanent guest principal with the Free State Symphony Orchestra, and Baroque traverso flautist with the Camerata Tinta Barocca. Bridget lectures at the South African College of Music at the University of Cape Town. She is highly sought after as a flute teacher, and many of her students have excelled in national competitions and in their overseas studies, won scholarships for study in Europe, the UK, and the USA, and now teach and perform, several occupying positions in South African orchestras. As both a practitioner and researcher in performing arts health, she is a licensed Andover Educator, and her PhD focused on tertiary musicians' occupational health education. She is chair of the steering committee of the newly-formed South African Performing Arts Health Association (SAPAHA) and is part of a Worldwide Universities Network (WUN) international collaborative study designing curricula for tertiary musicians' health education.

WINAND GRUNDLING completed his schooling at Brandwag High School in Uitenhage and obtained a BMus degree from the Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University in Port Elizabeth. He began his organ studies under Colin Campbell in 2002 and has since given organ recitals on national and international level. In 2006, Winand was chosen as one of seventeen organists worldwide to attend the Canadian International Organ Summer School in Calgary, where he also had master classes. He passed his ATCL Trinity Recital (Licentiate) examinations, as well as his Unisa Performance Licentiate with distinction. In 2012, he received the degree BMus Hons (cum laude) from Stellenbosch University with the quidance of Mario Nell. In 2012, Winand attended master classes presented by Professor Yin Kim (University of Seoul), as well as Professors Ton Koopman, Jean-Claude Zhender, Louis Bolliviard and Peter Planyavski at the International Haarlem Organ Summer School in the Netherlands, and Professor David Higgs at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, USA. In July of 2014 and 2015, he attended the International Bach Academy in Amsterdam (Waalse Church) hosted by Jaques van Oortmerssen. On national level, Winand has won the following competitions and prizes: Overall winner of the ABSA National Youth Music Competition (2004), Organ category winner at the ATKV Muzig Competition (2007/2009), the Charles Bryars Bursary (2007/2008), the SAMRO Merit Award (2009), the Mabel Quick Music Bursary (2009/2010), as well as overall winner of the Unisa Overseas Music Bursary Competition (2009), the ATKV Muziq Competition (2010), and the SAKOV Overseas Music Bursary Competition (2013). At the 2012 Klein-Karoo National Arts Festival (KKNK), Winand received two Kanna Awards for his production, 14 Stasies van die Kruis – for Best Classical Music Production and Best Upcoming Artist, Winand is the organist of the Dutch Reformed Church Stellenbosch-Welgelegen and is an accompanist for various choirs and South African artists. His debut CD, Toccata!, was launched in 2009. In 2012, he released his second album, 14 Stations of the Cross, at the KKNK, followed by 'The 7 Days of Creation' in 2014. In 2015 Winand received the Kanna Award for Best Classical Production for his production 'Bach-Vandag'.

MARIO NELL is a senior lecturer at the University of Stellenbosch. He studied at the Universities of Port Elizabeth and Stellenbosch before he completed his Masters degree in performance at the University of Cape Town and a PhD at the University of Stellenbosch. Also holding a UPLM from Unisa, he was the winner of the Unisa Overseas Music Bursary Competition. From 1999-2001 he furthered his studies at the Staatliche Hochschule für Musik in Freiburg, Germany. From 2006-2007 he also studied for his Nachdiplom at the Zurich University of the Arts in Switzerland where his main focus was on historical performance practice.

He won first prizes in all the major music competitions in South Africa. This includes the National Youth Music-, ATKV Prelude and Forte-, Mabel Quick-, Oude Meester- and Unisa Overseas Music Competitions. During his periods of study abroad he also distinguished himself in several important international competitions including a top prize at the Calgary International Competition with performances in Germany and Hong Kong. Since he made his debut with the SABC Orchestra in 1993, he has appeared as soloist with all the major orchestras in South Africa. Since 1999 he gave recitals in Germany, Switzerland, France, the Netherlands, Czech Republic, Italy, England and South Korea. He was also invited as guest professor at the national University of the Arts in Seoul, South Korea, in 2002 and 2003.

Besides a busy performance schedule as soloist, accompanist and chamber music musician, he is an active teacher and his students has been the overall winners of all the major music competitions in South Africa, eg the Sanlam-, Artscape-, Hubert van der Spuy, Artstrust Piano-, Hennie Joubert Piano -, Mabel Quick-, Samro -, Grahamstown National-, Unisa National Organ-, ATKV Muziq and Unisa Overseas Music Bursary Competitions. From 2010-2014 he received the University of Stellenbosch Rector's prize for excellence as teacher. He is often invited to give masterclasses and as juror for music competitions and serves as examiner for Unisa music examinations.
