

ARTISTIC REPORT

2018 CAPE TOWN BAROQUE FESTIVAL

The second Cape Town Baroque Festival took place from 21 to 23 September 2018. In keeping with the festival's aim, we brought together early music players and singers from across South Africa. This included baroque violinists Ralitza Macheva and Refiloe Olifant from Durban, local sopranos Elsabé Richter and Lynelle Kenned, mezzo soprano Lesibalwethu Sesanti, and organists Mario Nell and Winand Grundling. The following ensembles took part in the 2018 festival: local choir VOX Cape Town, Ensemble Je Ne Comprends Pas and Lutesong Duo.

In addition to the above performers, we also extended the programme this year by inviting two international specialists: South African-born Carin van Heerden (baroque oboe and recorder), international leader in her field, head of the Institute for Early Music and Performance Practice at the Anton Bruckner Privatuniversität in Linz, Austria, and co-founder of the Austrian 'L'Orfeo Barockorchester'; as well as Raphael Pouget (natural trumpet), also from Austria.

The festival had a varied programme, covering almost 200 years of the baroque aesthetic: from 17th-century Spanish and Italian music (by festival newcomers, local ensemble 'Lutesong Duo' with guests) to more popular early 18th-century repertoire (Vivaldi's *Gloria*) to an all-Mozart duo recital. As a special wild card, 'Ensemble Je Ne Comprends Pas' presented a programme of arrangements of David Bowie's music in a baroque style by Stellenbosch-based composer Jan-Hendrik Harley. The festival programme also included an architectural walking tour and master classes.

Management

The following people acted as the main festival organisers: Erik Dippenaar (artistic director), Alrich Rooy (finance director), and Louise Howlett, Michael Maas and Alida van der Walt (administrative team). The CTBF takes place under the auspices of Camerata Tinta Barocca and all the operations of CTB are overseen by the CTB Music Charitable Trust, which is a registered NPO and PBO. Our trustees are Quentin Crida, Erik Dippenaar, Adriaan Fuchs, Michael Maas and Sue Smith (Chair). We have two honorary patrons, Antoinette Lohmann and Dr Barry Smith.

Publicity

In addition to publicity via the CTB mailing list of just over 1 000 members, the festival ran an extensive social media publicity campaign on Facebook, Instagram and our website (www.ctbaroque.co.za), with a reach that is reflected in the following statistics:

- Facebook and Instagram Ad Reach: 241 536 people
- Facebook and Instagram Ad Impressions: 549 969 impressions (each person saw an ad 2.2 times)
- CTB Facebook Page Followers: 630
- CTBF Facebook Event Responses: 941 People (who expressed interest)

This year, the CTBF engaged in a media partnership with Fine Music Radio and, apart from the usual bought advertising time, the festival was covered on the following FMR programmes: *Cape Diary*, Louise Howlett's *For the Love of Opera*, Rodney Trudgeon's *People of Note*, and Anna Stoddard's *Baroque Bon-Bons* (four weekly programmes focussing on various aspects of the festival). Both the *People of Note* and *Baroque Bon-Bons* were made available as podcasts on the FMR website. Features about the festival were run on Radio Sonder Grense, Smile 90.4FM and Radio Kansel, and articles about the festival was published in *Die Burger*, *Imaginemag!*, *Atlantic Sun*, *Weekend Special*, *Volksblad* and various other publications.

Live broadcast

The opening concert on Friday 21 September was broadcast live on Fine Music Radio, bringing the festival into global reach through live streaming on the FMR website, as well as on DSTV channel 838.

This year, the CTBF had an overwhelming response from audiences, with several of the events sold out well in advance.

Training young players in period instrument playing

In the long run, the CTBF aims to invest substantially into the training of young, local players of period instruments. On Saturday 22 September, Carin van Heerden presented a morning of master classes to young South African recorder students. Individual master classes were taught to Jessica Daniels (Stellenbosch University) and high school learners Jeanni Verwey and Conner Lane. The morning was ended by a recorder ensemble from Stellenbosch University under the direction of Karin Maritz. The students taking part in this were: Jessica Daniels, Litha Mafila, Kim Classen, Caterina Reigl, Lauren Ramsey, Gemma Hall and Tony Rooms. Nine learners from CTB's Matzikama Music Week education project in Vredendal also attended the master classes as observers. The CTBF offered complementary tickets to all students and learners involved in the master classes to all of the other festival events.

Collaborations

In the 2018 festival we had several new collaborations with:

- the Cape Town Concert Series, in the chamber music concert on Saturday evening 22 September, Baxter
 Concert Hall
- the South African Slave Church Museum; the Mixed Doubles concert formed part of their Heritage Weekend cultural programme.
- Alexander Upstairs; the theatre attached to Alexander Bar in Strand Street hosted our David Bowie Reworked cross-over programme.

Employment

The CTBF is proud to have employed 25 local musicians during the course of the festival and the weeks preceding it, as well as eight administrative staff covering the organisational aspect of the festival (including publicity, marketing, design and various administrative responsibilities).
